Methods of Evaluation

Methods of Evaluation

Types	Examples of classroom assessments
Exams/Tests	Midterms and finals include both objective and essay style questions. For example: a. Final Exam Essay: Write a 3–4-page, handwritten essay comparing and contrasting a selected work from the post-impressionist period and a selected work from the Neue Sachlichkeit movement. The compared/contrasted works of art should be from similar categories of art, i.e., two paintings, two sculptures, etc. Essay will be evaluated on identification, discussion of formal elements, discussion of apparent and symbolic content and development of historical context.
Quizzes	Quiz after each unit of study. Quizzes may include both objective and essay-style questions.
Essays/Papers	Comparison/Contrast Essay based on museum visit. For example: Choose two works from the permanent collection at SFMOMA. Compare and contrast these works in terms of color, line, form, and content. Connect these works to their historical context, as discussed in class.

Reading Assignments

Selected readings from textbook, periodicals or library collection covering periods, cultures and artists discussed in lecture. For example:

- 1. Read chapter four, pages 72-77 covering the influence of modern steel manufacturing on architectural design at the end of the 19th century.
- 2. Read the supplemental handout covering the rise, importance and influence of art criticism in the 1950s.

Writing Assignments

1. Written evaluations of art viewed in museums and galleries.

Write a three-page essay based on an artwork from SFMOMA or Hess Winery Collection.

For example:

Using Francis Bacon's Portrait of a Man write a visual analysis exploring the materials, the use of paint, the composition, and the content. Connect this work to postwar European culture.

2. Topical essays expanding on course material.

For example:

Write a two-page essay comparing and contrasting a Surrealist and Abstract Expressionist painting, paying particular attention to the tenets of each movement and how these are expressed visually.

Other Assignments

1. Research project/presentation

For example:

Students are to select a topic related to a specific artist or movement covered in the course content. In a 4–5-page paper students analyze at least two works of art in terms of visual characteristics and link the works to their historic contexts. Each student will summarize his/her essay in a formal presentation, using PowerPoint/KeyNote.
